EISTEDDFOD Permanent festival

Steps were taken at a meeting of the General Council at Llangollen last night to make the International Eisteddfod a permanent institution in the town, and also to organise another Eisteddfod next year in view of the success of the recent one.

In order to safeguard the aims and permanence of the Eisteddfod, the meeting approved a recommendation that a board should be appointed comprising a representative of the Llangollen Council, Mr. W. S. Gwynn Williams (musical director), Mr. Harold Tudor (British Council) and Mr. G. S. Northing.

The Board will have power to co-opt three members of international standing, and they will control the venue of future festivals.

The main point of the resolution is that the International Eisteddfod will be an annual fixture in the town so long as it is wanted.

Presenting the financial statement, Major E. Denby-Jones, chairman of the Finance Committee, reported that there was a profit of £2,175 16s 10d. Total receipts were £5,825 18s 8d, and expenses £3,649 18s 10d.

Mr. Northing, chirman, paid tribute to the officials.

Mr. H. Tudor said that at least three new foreign choirs would compete next year.
